They patrol neighborhoods at night, but their identities are a secret. Many have full-time jobs and families.

They're real-life superheroes who take the law into their own hands, just like comic book heroes. Your next-door neighbor could be one.

They're viewed as a welcome presence in communities where people need all the help they can get — or as reckless criminals who

hinder police and put themselves and others at risk.

The latest additions to the group were three teens dressed as Batman and the Flash. The Royal Canadian Mounted Police warned the

- young superheroes two are 17 and the third is 18 - for taking matters into their own hands. All three still live at home with their parents. By real-life superhero standards, they were amateurs, dressing as existing superheroes.
- The hundreds of veterans have created their own personas. There's Thanatos in Vancouver, who's been patrolling the streets for four years dressed in a green-and-black mask,

wide-brimmed hat and a black trench coat, handing out water, food and blankets to the

- city's homeless. In Iqaluit, a masked man known as Polarman has patrolled the streets for about a decade, keeping an eye out for vandals. And there's New York City's Dark
- ³⁵ Guardian martial arts teacher Chris Pollak
 whose specialty is creeping up to drug dealers in parks and yelling "This is a drug-free park!" while shining a light at them.

Michael Barnett, director of the documentary
 Superheroes, spent 17 months following and filming about 50 self-styled superheroes after discovering the movement online. Every "superhero" has their own story and these stories show that their motivations vary.

- ⁴⁵ Some, like the Watchman, have a love of superheroes. The Wisconsin man puts on a mask to feed the homeless and has run successful toy drives for poor families during the holidays. He wouldn't talk about his day job,
- ⁵⁰ but said he has a wife and children and he's a college graduate. "I think the real world needs (superheroes) more than the comics and movies do, and I figured I can do my best to act like one," he said in an email, hiding his
- ⁵⁵ identity. "I was going to school to be a cop, but somewhere along the way I decided that wasn't what I wanted, yet I still wanted to do something."



"It's ultimately a protest movement. Instead of

- just protesting, they're actually trying to create change from the bottom up," Barnett said.
 "These are people who have no resources, for the most part, and they still are out there every night trying to do something. They're not any
- 65 better off than some of the people they're trying to help, but they're still trying to help them."

But, few of the masked men and women out there actually fight crime — and they don't have superpowers. They mostly do community

70 work, such as helping the homeless and patrolling troubled areas, handing out flyers.

Seattle's Phoenix Jones — real name Benjamin Fodor — leads the Rain City Superhero Movement, a group of self-styled superheroes

- ⁷⁵ who have patrolled the city since last year. Jones was arrested last month for using pepper spray to break up what he said was a fight outside a Seattle nightclub. No charges were filed, but the incident led to his dramatic un-
- 80 masking as a father whose day job was work-

ing with autistic children. "Phoenix Jones is not a bad guy," said Edward Stinson, an author, who provides mentorship and advice to the real-life superheroes online. And he now stresses the fact that this is no longer a game.

- As Seattle police spokesman Mark Jamieson said, intervening in potentially dangerous situations should be left to professional officers. "If people want to dress up and walk around,
- ⁹⁰ knock yourself out," he told the Associated Press. "Our concern is when you insert yourself into these situations without knowing the facts,it's just not a smart thing to do."

As the "heroes" continue to organize, Stinson
said the eventual goal is to develop relationships with the local police. But Barnett doesn't think that's realistic. Superheroes like to do their own thing. "Most people are doing this because they don't like bureaucracy, they don't
like rules," he said. "Police represent the system . . . part of why they do this is they're rebelling against that."
